Case Study: There are two populations of polar bears inhabiting Alaska. The Southern Beaufort Sea population has approximately 1500 bears. The Chukchi/Bering seas population has approximately 2000 bears. Both populations are declining. On May 8, 2009, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) listed the Polar Bear as a threatened species under the Endangered Species Act (ESA). Studies have demonstrated that significant losses of sea ice are being caused by climate disruption. Because polar bears depend upon sea ice for their sustenance, any reduction in sea ice negatively affects the number and behavior of polar bears and their prey, which puts polar bears at risk of becoming endangered in the foreseeable future. Alaska Natives are permitted by the USFWS to take polar bears for subsistence purposes; however this practice, combined with the loss of sea ice habitat, indicates that the Chukchi/Bering Seas population is declining below historical levels.
