

Marine Science Senior Project: Marine Birds and Mammals

For your final project, you will choose a species of marine bird or mammal. This project will count as your final exam (20% of the Term 4 grade). You will be provided with a grading rubric. Using the Internet, you will research the basic life history of a species and present the material in one of the following formats:

- PowerPoint presentation (minimum one slide for each of the listed requirements)
- Written report (must be typed)

Your project MUST INCLUDE:

Title Page/Title: should include species' name, as well as you name, period.

Classification: scientific name, common name; KPCOFGS; include any other notable related organisms.

Physical description: size, shape, unusual characteristics, adaptations and body systems; should include a diagram.

Habitat: description of habitat, marine life zone/ocean zone; any migration?

Feeding: diet and feeding relationships (predators, prey); describe their role in the ecosystem.

Development: description of reproduction and development. Any additional informative behaviors should be included here.

Current status: is the species threatened or endangered? What is the current population status? Is anything being done to protect the species?

Works Cited: you must properly cite (using the links on the back) AT LEAST 5 SOURCES – cite using MLA style.

Mechanics: proper spelling and grammar; complete sentences.

Neatness and Creativity: project must be typed (if completing a paper or poster); well organized and illustrated. PowerPoint presentations should include at least one picture on each slide.
